




Brianne Bishop, Founder of Brianne Bishop Design

My side-hobby gig is floral arranging and ice molds.

The project you will never forget.

My first big break was a high-end new build in the Bucktown neighborhood of Chicago with the most trusting of clients who really wanted to go outside the box. She pushed me to be as creative and unconventional as possible. The project was later on the cover of a magazine which was a major dream-come-true moment in my career.









Your favorite business tool or resource.

At the moment I would say Instagram. To be able to display our portfolio and process to the masses is invaluable. I also love finding inspiration and new sources there as well as staying in touch with my peers during this time of isolation within our industry!

The most timeless design.

I try to avoid trends at all times. When I can tell a client is desiring a certain trend we incorporate them into items that easy to change (ie: pillows, décor). To me timeless design respects the architecture of the interior it's within, clean lines, forms, and neutral palettes with accents coming from rugs, pillows, and art. I have a rule that every room needs something black and we focus heavily on contrast, texture, and scale in our designs as well as always having a one-of-a-kind piece in every room.





The biggest design faux pas.

Designing to a trend. Time goes too quickly to commit to something you may love now but not in a year when the new trend catches your interest! Also black-out window shades... they are never truly black-out and just completely remove the window. I find people keep them down at all times and then their room is dark and depressing. Window shades should be privacy and light filtering while allowing an over-drape to be the black-out function within the room.

Your design motto.

You should always be surrounded by pieces that you love and inspire you within your home.



If you were to design a room around one KOKET piece, which would it be, and why?

This was so tough as there are too many pieces that are so inspiring! The Luscious sofa sent my mind spinning. My dream home would be all black and white with a touch of vintage and a lot of rock and roll... and I find this sofa perfectly evokes that. I am always drawn to a good pleat and this full pleated, curved design is edgy and sexy.
